# What we do

## Kenya

My Start is an official Arts project for the educational charity Gwa Africa, founded by former child soldier turned award-winning Peace Activist and recording artist, Emmanuel Jal.

Since 2011, we have been running annual art and film workshops in Kakuma refugee camp, one of the world's largest refugee camps, to encourage young refugees to learn and express themselves through the Arts.

The workshops teach practical skills and build creative learning whilst bringing together the different ethnic refugee and host communities in a fun and dynamic way. The culmination of the workshops is an exhibition and award ceremony open for viewing to our participants' communities.

We have collaborated with artists and teachers within the refugee community and drawn from the varied skillsets of our professional team so that our students can produce to the very highest quality in drawing, painting, sculpture, animation, film and photography.

The work produced by the young refugees is then exhibited in London schools. It acts as a compelling, visual resource that can be used across the curriculum to support learning on conflict and conflict resolution, displacement and migration and in addition promotes peace, tolerance and empathy.

The exhibition encourages students to share and discuss their views as well as challenge misconceptions and existing perspectives, which is particularly relevant in the UK's increasingly global community.

The schools are encouraged to create response work which includes visual diaries and messages for the refugees in Kakuma that are then taken back to the camp and exhibited there.

My Start has successfully connected this remote refugee camp to a number of London schools and helped forge a relationship of support and solidarity.

# Educational packages

We offer a variety of educational packages to meet your school's needs. Our programming is accompanied by online resources and is designed to support your curricular objectives and key events in the school calendar.

Every penny made from our school packages goes directly towards developing and sustaining our projects. We have found that many schools are able to successfully fundraise or split costs between participating subject departments or year groups.

Photography workshops around the theme of 'self-identity'.

The workshop is open to approximately 16 students working with leading professionals at the Nikon school.

Using photographs on the theme of self-identity taken in Kakuma Refugee Camp by young refugees as their starting point, they will have the opportunity to use the latest Nikon equipment and state-of-the-art studio to create stunning photographs that can be included in their student portfolio and provide prints for us to exhibit at Kakuma Refugee Camp.

This creative workshop explores the idea of identity and background whilst also creating a powerful medium to connect your school with Kakuma.

## **Full School Assembly or Talks £200**

We visit your school and run an assembly about our project and the broader context of Kakuma Refugee Camp.

The assembly includes a presentation, a short film about our charity, a Q&A session and films produced by our students from the camp.

(for a whole year group) to maximise the impact  
of the content we cover.**



## **School Workshops**

We offer a variety of workshops for your students to create response work to the art and films they view from Kakuma.

This unique opportunity enables students to connect and communicate directly with young people in the camp and reinforces links of empathy and understanding.

We can run art, film or literacy-based projects and the work produced will be taken back to Kakuma Refugee Camp and exhibited to the communities we work with there.

Workshops are personally tailored to fit with your schedule, curriculum and educational objectives.

The essential role that Art has played in the lives of young people living in Kakuma has become increasingly apparent, through the impressive drive, commitment and growth of talent and leadership within this community.




